NOTES FROM PREP MEETING

July 1 2018

<u>Quaker week</u> this year is from Saturday 29 September to Sunday 7 October. Outreach group are organising 'Bring a friend to Meeting' on 7 October and are obtaining new posters and information packs for the occasion.

Constance Nash of the **Dorking Refugee Support Group** is sending out a questionnaire 'What do you think about refugees?' to local churches and has asked the Meeting if we would be willing to act as a postbox for completed questionnaires. For practical reasons we decided that unfortunately we could not offer this service although we will of course collect and return any questionnaires completed by members of the Meeting.

Following the success of the <u>outdoor Meeting for Worship</u> at the Kosmon Sanctuary Elders and Overseers offered to arrange an outdoor MfW in the MH garden. Friends felt that the front garden might be most suitable being level ground and perhaps be a form of outreach. Elders and Overseers were asked to discuss the idea further and offer a date plus an alternative should the weather be unsuitable and arrange with children's committee how we might involve the children.

After a friendly discussion it was discerned that the feeling of the Meeting was that the **front door should be left unlocked during**Meeting for Worship. The inner door keeper would be alerted by anyone entering and if they don't recognise them they will go out and welcome them. It was noted that the back door however should be kept locked. To minimise disturbance it was suggested, but not minuted, that those arriving after 10.35 should wait in the front lobby and come into MfW with the outer door-keeper at 10.45 when the children leave.

Judy introduced <u>Premises's proposed work on trees</u> and requested agreement to the expected cost of £1000. The yew tree growing at the front between the cherry tree and the Butter Hill House wall is to be felled and the stump ground out. Various trees in the back garden need attention, also the tree growing near the cottage front door and ivy regrowth needs removing from the front boundary wall. Meeting agreed expenditure up to £1200.

The Meeting agreed that <u>Outreach</u> committee have a annual designated budget. They are planning a seeded meeting with the children's committee on the theme of equality but no date is set as yet. Elders and Overseers have agreed to support an evening candlelit meeting on November 11th to mark the end of World War 1 and remind ourselves of the need to work for peace. Members of other churches will be invited.

The <u>November collection</u> will be for the new project of QCEA involving quiet diplomacy to promote peace and human rights in Europe. This could be promoted at the November 11th evening meeting.

The current <u>clerking arrangements</u> will come to an end in December, when Su Johnston stands down and the clerking team ask all to consider carefully options for 2019. This will be a priority item in September's PM.

The aim is

- For Friends to begin considering criteria they'd wish to consider against ways forward.
- A sense of the next step.

This session picks up from AM in March when Elders and Overseers met to consider 'the future of West Weald Area Meeting', which it hoped would 'be followed further at a Fellowship meeting in July'; and from the report from trustees to AM in May, which asked whether, in view of the impending lack of trustees available to keep AM functioning as a legal entity, AM wished trustees to explore, among other things, the possibility of 'laying down the AM with the transfer of its Local Meetings and its assets to such adjacent Area Meetings as are prepared to accept them'.

Kersti, who is organising the Fellowship session on Saturday July 7th at the Blue Idol titled Where is the new life in our Area Meeting? And which way forward will allow it to flourish?, has suggested some reading which might be useful preparation for the session. It is a blog about another area meeting going through a very similar exercise. It's called, 'Right, then, who'd like to be Treasurer?'


Some of us in Meeting are approaching the 70s, 80s and 90s so your Elders thought it might be a good idea to offer an update on end of life issues.

- Dorking Quaker's funeral form now includes the following words: This form will be used by the Elders to assist in making arrangements for your funeral, <u>if their help is requested</u>. To obtain contact details for the current Elders ring 01306 884020.
 - In the past we have put the phone number of serving Elders or Clerks on the form but these will become out-of-date. There is now a message on the Meeting's ansaphone (01306 884020) giving the current Elders' phone numbers. This message will be updated when necessary so the relatives should have no trouble contacting an Elder for assistance. Those who have completed an earlier version of the form may wish to change the wording appropriately on their copy, stored with their Will.
- Advance Decision to Refuse Treatment (Living Will) and Lasting Powers of Attorney
 can be useful things to have arranged if you are approaching the later years of your
 life. Information, including the form to complete for a Living Will, is available from
 Compassion in Dying https://compassionindying.org.uk/library/advance-decision-pack/ or ask Anne for a copy.
- Dealing with bereavement. The Meeting's upholding prayer group will be pleased to offer its supportive prayer – speak to Trish, Anne or Eleanor. There are the following organisations offering support to the bereaved:
 - Cruse Bereavement Care: Mole Valley Branch email <u>surrey.east@cruse.org.uk</u> or call **o2o 8393 7238.** You will get an answer phone message asking you to leave your name and telephone number. A volunteer will telephone you within 24 hours and take some details. An appointment will be arranged for a Bereavement Volunteer to visit you when mutually convenient.
 - The name 'Cruse' derives the Old Testament passage about a widow's cruse, or jar of oil, which never ran out, thus signifying that support would be given as long as it was needed and there would always be a drop of comfort available. It is a non-religious organisation welcoming people of all beliefs and none.
 - MASH Men Alone Self Help. A group of men who are alone due to bereavement meet in the upstairs room at Burgundy and Black, a cafe in St Martins Walk, Dorking RH14 1UT, on each Thursday between 4 and 6 pm.
