'A SURREY MEMORY'

Why do we walk to Leith Hill and back, each year, one day in April? It may be hot, cold, wet, dry Whatever the weather Quakers still take to the hills, but why? This year Martin Hunka related the story behind this annual event (see photo)

Peggy Kohler, a member of Dorking Meeting, was working at Friends' House Library in the 1970s when she found an article in the Friends Quarterly Examiner from 1909. It had been written by William Nash who remembered his youth in

Surrey in the 1850s when he and a good friend Edward Bennett used to walk to every Monthly Meeting and enjoyed many rambles through the Surrey countryside. A favourite one was from Capel to the top of Leith Hill. They attended Capel meeting, which was small with only two families – the Sargents and the Dales. One day only Edward and William were present at Meeting – but they decided to keep the Meeting remembering the Query 'Are meetings for worship and discipline kept up?'

In 1977 Peggy and her husband Charles suggested a walk from Capel Meeting House to Leith Hill and back and, as it was a successful and enjoyable day, it was decided to commemorate Edward Bennett and William Nash's favourite ramble annually. The last walk was in 1993,

and Peggy died shortly afterwards. She and Charles are buried in Capel Meeting's Burial Ground.

In 2012 the Brewers reinstated the walk, led by Peggy and Charles' son, Chris – and it has continued since. Why not join us next year?


SANCTUARY CHURCHES Chichester Saturday 19 May

Elizabeth writes: I went to an interesting exhibition at Ditchling Museum of Art and Craft about the German graphic designer Elizabeth Friedlander. You may not have heard of her, but you will be familiar with her work – she designed the old heading for the *Times* Newspaper, many covers for Penguin books and exquisite borders for music books in the 1950s. I was interested to see that as a Jewish woman she was helped to safety by the Society of Friends and -was able to enter England on a 'Domestic Service' visa – and there is a letter on display from Friends House welcoming her to the UK.

DID YOU SEE: QUAKERS IN THE NEWS!

Congratulations to Horsham Repair Café, which was shortlisted for one of the
Green Heart Hero Awards. It was reported in the Friend in April that Horsham
Resident Friend, Helen Whittington, introduced a monthly refill facility at Horsham
Meeting House several years ago – saving thousands of plastic bottles from landfill.
Sussex Green Living, in 2017, considered the Meeting House an excellent location
for the Repair Café and Horsham Meeting agreed that the project would fit in well
with the Canterbury commitment.

The project was nominated by the local MP Jeremy Quinn in the 'Community Inspiration' category in recognition of 'work to encourage people to upcycle or repair items, thus conserving resources and reducing waste'.

- The Guardian recently published a short article about a group of young Quakers in Nottingham who recorded their meeting as a podcast The Silence Special. It is a recording of a 30 minute silent meeting in Nottingham Meeting House with only the sound of a clock ticking and pages turning and the rain outside. The group publish a monthly podcast and wanted to 'share a small oasis of calm, and a way to provide a moment of stillness, for people on the move' as well as giving people an opportunity to find out more about Quakerism. (Guardian, Monday 9th April 2018) (Also reported in the Friend, 27th April).
- The Guardian Letters Page, the following day, published two separate letters from Quakers! One was from Alison Leonard (Hebden Bridge) who often writes for the Friend, and the second was from Philip and Margaret Baker from Welwyn Garden City. They wrote about truth and quoted part of Advice and Queries No. 17:

Do not allow the strength of your convictions to betray you into making statements and allegations that are unfair or untrue. Think it possible that you may be mistaken.




MEDITATION and SPIRITUAL ENQUIRY

Catherine writes: The Meditation and Spiritual Enquiry Group have found listening to a recording of a speaker is a good way to stimulate thinking and discussion. In April we listened to Laurence Freeman. We have also been experimenting with different methods of breathing meditations. In April we celebrated wonderful weather with meditation in the Meeting House garden.

ETHICAL BUSINESS: THE MESSAGE LIVES ON

A great-great-great-grandson of John Cadbury (founder of the original Cadbury factory in Birmingham) has started his own chocolate company – **Love Cocoa.** James Cadbury was influenced by the ethics of the original company - 'he did some amazing things, such as being the first employer to give employees weekends off and building Bournville village to house his workers' – and James hopes that he can meet those standards. He aims to source the cocoa responsibly, guaranteeing an above Fairtrade price, and will be donating 10 percent of profits to a rainforest charity fighting against deforestation for palm oil. James is also developing plant-based recipes and is launching a few cocoa bars which contain no sugar – he is aware that consumers want a healthier product. When John Cadbury started his business he wanted to make chocolate that was pure and honest – other manufacturers apparently put brick dust into their products! Writing in **Vegetarian Living** James hopes 'that the original Cadbury entrepreneur would be proud of what his descendent has achieved with **Love Cocoa**'.

Anne writes: Our Friend Judy is a Trustee of the Kosmon Sanctuary, and she has kindly arranged for us to hold an outdoor Meeting for Worship in the woods there on Sunday, 20 May. The Meeting will start at the usual time of 10.30 am, and perhaps end after 30 or 45 minutes if that feels right. Hopefully, the wonderful display of bluebells in the woods will still be around to delight us! Also, if Friends wish, they can make use of the two labyrinths there for meditative walking. There are facilities for making tea/coffee after meeting and a comfortable lounge area for those who wish to sit indoors. There will be activities for the children using the custom-made children's clearing in the woods, and three families are already planning to be there.

We will need to organize transport for those without cars, so it would be useful to know who intends coming. However, Colin and I have visited the Sanctuary on our bikes and hope to cycle there again on the 20th, if the weather is kind! So that is an option for the energetic or those who have electric bikes! If it is raining we will hold the Meeting in the hall inside. Local villagers will be invited to join us if they wish. The outing is unfortunately on the same Sunday as a Traidcraft stall at Meeting, but Trish or Frances P. have kindly offered to take orders and do your shopping for you!

Elizabeth writes: As a local villager I am so pleased to be able to welcome you to Walton on the Hill. If you are driving here please be aware that it can take up to 30 minutes from Dorking as it is a popular biking and horse riding route! Go up Pebble Hill from the A25 and after the bridge over the M25 take the first turning on the left – Chequers Lane. This will take you into the village. Just before the church there is a garage next to a small village green – the entrance is immediately opposite on the left, just beyond the long wall and the bus stop. There will be someone there to guide you!
